STUDENT ATTENDANCE

Regular attendance at school is critical to ensuring that every student has the kind of opportunities in life that he or she deserves.

When students are not at school, they are missing out on so much learning. Missing just 2 days a month is the equivalent of missing 4 weeks of school every year – almost 10% of their learning.

We do understand that children may sometimes need to be absent from school through sickness or misadventure. We understand the work demands of parents and their ability to take leave does not always coincide with school holiday periods.

We ask that leave for extended periods – such as overseas holidays – is kept to a minimum - and wherever possible within the usual school holiday periods.

When a student is not sick and requires leave, the Principal – Mrs Bellenger - needs to be notified of this in writing prior to that leave being taken. If the leave is not approved, you will be informed in writing by the school office.

Where a leave application is for 5 days or more, parents are required to complete and submit the Application for Extended Leave form for approval. The form can be found on the school's website in Community/Notes & Forms/Administration Forms. All children accessing extended leave for travel need to be issued with a certificate of extended leave approved by the principal.

CYBERSAFETY

Here are some tips for parents to keep your child safe online:

BE SAFE

• Be aware of how your child uses the internet and explore it with them

• Set rules and monitor to make sure your child knows what information they can share or post online and which websites they can visit

• Teach your child to tell a trusted adult if they feel uncomfortable about something they have found on the internet or received in an email

• Discuss with your child the importance of keeping personal information private. This sort of information can be used to identify or locate where they live, go to school or activities in which they are involved

BE RESPECTFUL

• Talk to your children about cyber bullying. Online communication should be responsible and respectful

- Children and adolescents who are being cyber bullied sometimes change their behaviour. If you are concerned they might be a victim of cyber bullying, talk to them and tell them you are concerned. Arrange a talk with a teacher or school counsellor
- Advise your child not to respond to any negative messages and to keep evidence. Tell them to report any negative messages they receive to you or another trusted person/adult

• Children and their parents can contact social media companies and ask for defamatory material to be taken down. If the material is not gone within 48 hours, a complaint can be lodged with the Office of the Children's eSafety Commissioner at <u>www.esafety.gov.au</u>

BE RESPONSIBLE

• Consider using inbuilt filters and controls on your digital devices and home network to manage your children's online access. Keep your virus protection up to date

- Talk with your child about being careful when downloading files or clicking on links. Some files or links may have harmful viruses or are trying to obtain personal information
- Certain online activities (downloading illegal videos or music, plagiarism, sexting, identity theft, 'hacking' networks) are illegal and can result in criminal charges

PARKING AROUND THE SCHOOL

Please remember the road rules around the school when dropping off and picking up your children.

If you are using the car pick up/drop off area, please remember that is not a parking area. If you need to get out of the car, you will need to find parking elsewhere.

When picking up your children in the afternoon, parents form a queue on Armitage Drive. Please do not cut in on the queue, as this only upsets parents who have been patiently waiting their turn. Please go to the end of the line.

Also, the car parks on school grounds near the office and the hall are for **staff parking only**. Parents are not permitted to park here. Only those with disabled parking permits are able to park here.

SOCIAL SKILL—BEING A PROBLEM SOLVER AT ST FRANCIS OF ASSISI

Problem solving is a tool, a skill and a process. It is a tool because it can help you solve an immediate problem or to achieve a goal. It is a skill because once you have learnt it, you can use it repeatedly, like the ability to ride a bicycle, add numbers or speak a language. At St Francis of Assisi we encourage the students to use a range of thinking skills, plan and carry out investigations, consider different strategies, find things out before making decisions and solve a variety of problems at school and at home. Teaching children to become effective thinkers is recognised as an important goal of education. For students to function successfully in a highly technical society, they must be equipped with lifelong learning and thinking skills necessary to process information in an ever-changing world.
