
It is an opportunity to pray for each other and for the whole school family.

COMPASS PARENT PORTAL

As we begin the new school year it is timely to take a few minutes to check that your communication channels are all up to date and working as they should be.

It is important to check that you are receiving notifications from the Compass Parent App. This is the most common reason why people do not see the messages when sent out.

SCHOOL FEES

Statements for school fees will be posted out by Monday 13th February 2023. Payments are due by Wednesday 15th March. If your arrangement was stopped or cancelled for 2022 you will receive Flexible Payment Plans (FPP) documents with your first 2023 school fees statement. Billing periods for 2023 are as follows:

ATTENDANCE

Regular attendance at school is essential if students are to maximise their potential. It is a legislative requirement that students attend school every day unless of course they are unwell, or it is imperative that they attend an important event.

If you child is absent from school, the office does need to be notified by 9.30am. This can be done via the Compass Parent App, email or phone.

SCHOOL UNIFORM

As a school, we work with families to ensure that our students wear their uniforms correctly and are suitably presented at all times. We believe that by encouraging students to take pride in themselves and their appearance, we are establishing important life skills, promoting self-esteem and a sense of belonging to our school community. Students at St Francis are required to wear the correct school uniform every day and this includes their school hat. The sport uniform is only to be worn on designated sports days. The uniform policy can be found in this newsletter.

MATHEMATICAL ASSESSMENT INTERVIEWS (MAI)

Last Monday out teachers all appreciated the opportunity to meet with each child to conduct their MAI. It was the perfect opportunity for the teachers to make a personal connection with each child before everyone meets together as a class. I know that a number of children were prevented from attending the MAI for a number of a reasons. The teachers will endeavour to complete the MAI with these students over the next few weeks.

PARENT QUESTIONNAIRE

We are most mindful of the need to get to know our students. Therefore, in order for teachers to gain valuable insights about your child and their needs, we ask you to complete a questionnaire which was sent home today with your child on a pink paper. We ask that once completed you return it to the class teacher in a sealed envelope by Friday 10th February. Further communication from classroom teachers will occur in the coming weeks.

DIOCESAN SCHOOL FEES

Annual Diocesan Tuition Fee can be paid upfront at the start of the year or as three equal instalment payments in Terms 1, 2 and 3. The fee is only charged for the first three (3) children currently enrolled in the diocese (in other words there is no additional Diocesan Tuition Fee for the fourth child attending a systemic school in the diocese or other participating Catholic schools - **see 'Sibling Discounts' below**). KINDERGARTEN 2023

There was great excitement on Thursday morning as our new Kindergarten students commenced their first week at St Francis. It was wonderful to watch the children arrive at school so smartly dressed in their new uniforms and so enthusiastic for their next part of their life's journey. They have all settled in well to school life. We look forward to welcoming our new Kindies at our Opening School Mass.



LABELLING OF ITEMS

After the expense of purchasing uniform items, there is nothing worse than the loss or misplacement of them. More often than not, it has just been left in the school playground or been picked up by another child. Avoid undue stress and ensure **ALL BELONGINGS** are clearly labelled with your child's name. If items are labelled they are put into our lost property box, and these items will be returned to the appropriate children.

IMPORTANT ALLERGY INFORMATION

At St Francis, we have a number of children who have severe allergies to nuts. While allergic reactions are common and most are not serious, for some people the reaction can be life threatening. This is called anaphylaxis and can occur in minutes of an exposure to a trigger, in these children's case, nuts.

We see prevention as a major part of providing a safe environment for these children. So as to support our community's effort in this regard, parents are requested not to send nuts or foods containing nuts to school with their children.

The following list gives examples of such foods.

- Peanuts, hazelnuts, almonds, cashews, macadamia nuts
- Peanut butter
- Nutella
- Biscuits and cakes containing nuts
- Snack packs containing nuts
- Chocolate bars containing nuts e.g. Picnics, Mars Bars (almond), Nut Breaks and Fruit and Nut chocolates.
- Marzipan and nougat
- Breakfast cereals containing nuts e.g. Crunchy Nut/Honey Nut Cornflakes, Muesli, Nutrigrain
- Muesli Bars and snack bars containing nuts
- Yoghurt and nut mixer packs
- Confectionary items such as Lolly Gobble Bliss Bombs and Rocky Road
- Uncle Toby's yoghurt muesli bars.

We realise that there may be trace elements of nuts in a variety of other foods. However, if you use the above list as a guide you will be doing your part. Parents can also reinforce with their children that sharing food is not allowed at St Francis. If you have any concerns or questions, please contact the school. Thank you for your support and understanding in helping us cater to the health needs of all of our children.

BIRTHDAY TREATS

Celebrating a birthday is something all children look forward to!

If your child wishes to bring a treat to school to share with their friends (purely optional), we kindly ask that you send in cupcakes or donuts. Cupcakes or donuts are preferred as they are easy to hand out and are a treat that all children enjoy. Due to a multitude of allergies present, we ask that you do not send lollies, chocolates or other treats. Similarly, at Easter or Christmas, we ask that you do not send in lollies, chocolates or candy canes.

If your child has allergies, you are welcome to send some cakes in a labelled container for your child, which will be kept in the freezer in the staffroom and given out as necessary. Thank you for supporting us as we endeavour to keep all children safe.

HOW CAN YOU RECEIVE A NEWSLETTER?

The newsletter will be sent out to families through the Compass Parent App or you can subscribe to the newsletter through our website. This year the newsletter will be sent out three times a term, the beginning, middle and end.

PARKING IN THE STAFF CAR PARK

Just a friendly reminder to our families that no parents are permitted to park in the staff car park. The car park is for staff only. Please use the drop off or car pick up bay if you do not want to leave your vehicle. This is a much safer option as the car park gets quite busy and is unsafe for children. Please also remember to wait your turn in the car pick up queue whether it be in the morning for drop off or in the afternoon for pick up. We have been advised that some parents have been 'jumping the queue'. Not only is this unfair for those who have been waiting their turn but also very unsafe.

AFTERNOON DISMISSAL

You will now be able to come onto the school grounds to collect your children at the end of the school day. We do ask if you can stand on the playground, away from the learning streets when collecting your children. If your children are in Years 3 to 6 you will also need to remain downstairs on the playground.

Kindergarten children and their siblings will be dismissed at 2.50pm for the next couple of weeks.

Please have a chat with your children so you can arrange a meeting place. Car pick up and COSHC will remain the same.

WHY IS MY CHILD'S TEACHER OUT OF CLASS?

Like professionals in other fields, all teachers are required to keep up to date with current thinking on best practices and new developments in areas such as technology. From time to time teachers are required to attend professional development opportunities to learn about changes to curriculum, new methods of teaching and learning, and other ways of integrating technology. These sessions sometimes occur during the day, after school or in the school holidays. Teachers also have entitlements such as long service leave, maternity leave, family leave, sick leave, bereavement leave, jury duty etc. Consequently, there will be times when your child's teacher is absent from the classroom. On these days the teacher's program and day book is followed. Teachers on a grade work closely together allowing the grade partner to liaise with the relief teacher so that good teaching and learning continues, and routines are kept. We thank you for your support in this matter.

St Francis of Assisi Primary School Uniform and Grooming Policy

We take pride in our school uniform and encourage the children to do so too. It is important that the children wear the appropriate uniform on the correct day to suit the activities planned.

Parents are asked to ensure their children wear the correct uniform and not deviate from the items mentioned in the list.

School Bag

St Francis of Assisi school bag is compulsory for all students.

Jewellery

- Students with pierced ears are to wear only one set of plain gold or silver sleepers or studs.
- Nail polish and / or make up is not to be worn.
- Only signet rings may be worn to school, no other rings may be worn by students.
- Only medical bracelets may be worn. Ornamental bangles, bracelets, charity bands or anklets are not to be worn.
- A single necklace of religious nature may be worn underneath the student's school uniform.

Hair

- Hairstyles are to be neat and simple and devoid of any cosmetic colouring or bleaching.
- Boy's haircuts are not to be multilayered (such as pronounced undercuts, designs or steps), or below the collar in length (including rats tails) unless there are religious or cultural reasons.
- Girls or boys with shoulder-length hair or longer are to have it tied back away from the face and eyes. This
 is for hygiene reasons and to allow clear vision.
- All hair accessories worn by girls are to be in plain school colours of green and yellow or students may
 wear white or black hair accessories.

Shoes

- School shoes are to be black and polishable.
- Sports shoes should be appropriate runners or joggers and does not include high-tops, mid-cut shoes, slipons or trend shoes. This is to provide appropriate adequate support during physical activity.
- Sports shoes are to be predominantly white or predominantly black and devoid of bright colours, patterns
 or slogans.

School hats

- Students are to wear the correct school hat every day, regardless of weather. If students do not have a hat, they will be directed to remain in the designated shaded areas.
- Hats are to be worn correctly, with the flap down and the peak of the cap pointing forward.
- Hats should be in good condition and should not be drawn on or have stickers placed on them.
- Old or torn hats should be replaced as quickly as possible.

Basis of discretion

- Families who cannot purchase the correct uniform due to financial reasons are encouraged to use the uniform pool or speak to the principal.
- On fitness days, students are to bring their sports shoes to school in a bag. They must change back into school shoes after fitness.
- Year 6 students are allowed to wear their souvenir graduation polo shirt on sports days.
- Parents should submit an explanatory letter informing the school about an incorrect clothing item being worn.
- Classroom teachers are responsible for maintaining and checking that the correct uniform is being worn. If
 there is no parent explanation supplied about a student's incorrect uniform, a uniform note, from the class
 administration folders, will be sent home to parents.

All items of clothing must be clearly marked with the child's full name. Shoes should be marked on the inside. The school accepts no responsibility for items which have been lost.

If for any reason, including religious reasons, a child is unable to wear correct uniform parents are required to supply a letter of explanation.
